

ROBIN L. MEAD '72 · Alumna and Former Vice Chair of the Board of Trustees

Robin L. Mead '72 earned an associate degree from then-Colby Junior College in 1972 and a bachelor's degree in government from the College of William and Mary in 1975.

Upon graduation, Robin worked as a professional golfer, both as a touring pro and as an assistant pro at a private country club. Later, she served as a partner for the Mead/JRRR Corporation in Endicott, N.Y., a privately held, family-owned company involved with property management, investing and venture capital.

Robin has been a devoted alumna and volunteer for the college. She served on the Board of Trustees from 1998 to 2007, and again from 2008 to 2018, serving as vice chair of the board and chair of the Advancement Committee. She served on the Colby-Sawyer College presidential search committees in 2006 and 2016. A 2018 recipient of the Colby-Sawyer Distinguished Alumni Award, Robin has served as a class agent and reunion chair. She was a member of the Power of Infinity Campaign Steering Committee from 2015 to 2018 and the Trustee Campaign Planning Task Force from 2019 to 2021. She has made Colby-Sawyer a philanthropic priority, supporting initiatives that will have the greatest impact on students, like the creation of The Stable, the college store in the Ware Student Center.

Robin has also made extensive contributions as a volunteer in the Binghamton, N.Y. area. She received both the Health Leadership Award from the United Health Services Foundation and the Woman of Distinction Award from Girl Scouts of New York-Penn Pathways, Inc. She is a former trustee of the Binghamton University Foundation, United Health Services Foundation and Binghamton Philharmonic.

DAVID B. PAYNE · Former Member of the Board of Trustees

David B. "Dave" Payne served on the Colby-Sawyer College Board of Trustees from 2006 to 2015 and again from 2016 to 2021, lending his financial expertise to the board as a member of the Audit, Advancement, Finance, Campus Planning, Investment and Executive committees, as well as the Power of Infinity Campaign Steering Committee.

In 2019, Dave and his wife, Beverly, were inducted into the college's Legends Society, which recognizes donors who have contributed \$1 million or more to Colby-Sawyer throughout their lifetimes. Dave and Bev have made a significant impact on Colby-Sawyer by investing in a number of capital projects, including the Windy Hill School and the Davidow Center for Art + Design. They are faithful supporters of student scholarships and the Chargers Club, encouraging others to give to the Colby-Sawyer Fund. In addition, through their careful planning, the Paynes' generosity will benefit the college for years to come by virtue of a planned gift to be made through their estate. Dave earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in economics from Dartmouth College in 1958 and worked for 30 years for the Connecticut Bank and Trust Company (CBT). He was chief financial officer and president of CBT, and then chief financial officer of Bank of New England. He is the retired chair of Trust Company of Connecticut, which he founded in 1991.

Dave served as a director of several organizations in the Greater Hartford area, including Hartford Hospital, Hartford Healthcare, the Hartford Graduate Center, Institute of Living, McLean Home and the Westminster School. In Simsbury, he served several terms on the Board of Education and the Board of Finance. He is a past president of the Hartford Society of Financial Analysts, past chair of the Connecticut Bankers Association and former board member of First New England Capital.

Locally, Dave is a past trustee of the Ausbon Sargent Land Preservation Trust, and he currently serves on the New London Citizen's Advisory Committee and the Kearsarge Area Council on Aging Board of Trustees. He and his wife, Bev, reside in Elkins, N.H.



HONORARY DOCTOR OF HUMANE LETTERS (L.H.D.)

Colby-Sawyer's Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree recognizes an individual of humanitarian character and superior intellect whose life and work have brought about positive, far-reaching consequences for individuals and organizations.

SONJA CARLSON DAVIDOW '56 · Alumna and Trustee Emerita

Sonja Carlson Davidow graduated from the college in 1956 with an Associate of Arts degree. She met her husband, Bill, when she was a student in Colby Junior College's medical secretary program and he was attending Dartmouth College.

Sonja and Bill settled in Woodside, Calif., where they raised their two daughters, Carolyn and Rebecca. Sonja worked as a medical secretary at Stanford University and then volunteered in the local community. She has served as chair of the Town of Woodside Historical Committee, a member of the Town Council and a supporter of many area organizations. She served as an alumni trustee on the Colby-Sawyer Board of Trustees from 1989 to 1992 and was a member of the Board Organization, Capital Campaign and Enrollment Committees, lending her leadership to the board during a pivotal period in the college's history. Sonja has a love of the arts that began with her grandfather, an artist who devoted his life to painting. Recognizing the arts as an important component of living a full life, Sonja and Bill have shown extraordinary support for the arts at Colby-Sawyer. They were inducted into Colby-Sawyer's Legends Society in 2013 for lifetime contributions totaling more than \$1 million. In 2021, they contributed an additional \$10.2 million, the largest gift in college history, and they established "The Davidow Challenge," providing matching gifts made to endowed scholarship funds. They funded the Sonja C. Davidow '56 Endowed Chair of Fine Arts and the Sonia C. and William H. Davidow Endowed Chair. Both the Davidow Center for Art + Design and the William H. and Sonja Carlson Davidow '56 Fine Art Gallery are named in their honor.

Sonja is a collector of fine art. She enjoys travel, needlepoint, gardening, reading and spending time with her four grandchildren.



JACK JENSEN AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING

The Jack Jensen Award for Excellence in Teaching is the college's highest teaching award. It honors a teacher who communicates high expectations and encourages intellectual curiosity within and across disciplines; respects diverse talents and ways of learning and uses variety in instruction; and engages students and inspires them to do their best work. The award is named for the late Professor Jack Jensen who, through his dedication to teaching, inspired faculty and students alike.

KIMBERLY FRANCE · Assistant Professor, School of Business & Social Sciences

Assistant Professor Kimberly France joined the School of Business & Social Sciences faculty in 2017 with more than 20 years of senior management experience. She holds a Bachelor of Arts in linguistics from the University of New Hampshire and a Master of Science in management from New England College. Her teaching interests include human resource management, labor relations, business law and ethics, marketing and career readiness.

Kim challenges her students to approach their work heuristically and with curiosity. Through hands-on activities based on real-world scenarios, readings on current trends and events, relevant case studies, multimedia presentations and simulations, she actively engages students to help them gain a deeper understanding of course content. She pushes students to make connections between the concepts they are studying and the practical applications of those concepts. She also encourages them to consider how they can use what they've learned to make meaningful contributions in the workplace and in their communities. Building connections with students outside the classroom is a high priority for Kim. She lives in a faculty apartment in a college residence hall, and she immerses herself in the campus community through various activities and events. When the college went remote because of COVID-19 in the spring of 2020 and a handful of students had to remain on campus, Kim stayed in frequent contact with them, inviting them to go for socially distanced walks outside and talking to them about the challenges they were facing.

Kim serves as the faculty mentor for the Colby-Sawyer equestrian team and the women's soccer team, and she is an advisor for the BOLD Women's Leadership Network. Outside the college, Kim is a private human resource management consultant for both businesses and nonprofit organizations. She is also the proud mother of two adult children.



DAVID H. WINTON BACCALAUREATE AWARD

The David H. Winton Baccalaureate Award is presented to the baccalaureate degree graduate who ranks highest in scholarship among those in the graduating class.

KAYLA FRAZIER '22

Nursing major Kayla Frazier, from Lee, N.H., graduates with an outstanding academic record in addition to professional accomplishments at her clinical site, Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center, where she earned a competitive preceptorship placement in the Intensive Care Nursery (ICN). Kayla's position in the ICN required exceptional clinical skill and careful attention to the ethical, psychosocial and cultural needs of her patients. One faculty member noted, "Kayla's preceptorship experience enhanced her understanding of patients as holistic beings with diverse physical, mental and spiritual needs."

Kayla completed an internship in the summer of 2021 as a licensed nursing assistant in the Surgical/Trauma Intensive Care Unit at Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center. She was also a member of the Capstone team whose project, titled "Assessment of SMART Goal Knowledge in the Employees of the Lake Sunapee Region Visiting Nurse Association," won the Capstone prize in nursing.

A member of the Student Nurses Association and Alpha Chi Honor Society, Kayla established a reputation for being a thoughtful student who balances advocacy and moral agency, science and art in the provision of person-centered care.

After graduation, Kayla will be employed as a registered nurse in the ICN at Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center.

DAVID H. WINTON BACCALAUREATE AWARD

The David H. Winton Baccalaureate Award is presented to the baccalaureate degree graduate who ranks highest in scholarship among those in the graduating class.

HANNAH ELIZABETH TIFFANY '22

Hannah Elizabeth Tiffany, a child development major with a minor in education from Enosburg Falls, Vt., has distinguished herself as an exceptional scholar and community member. Hannah's impressive academic performance earned her the Child Development Baccalaureate Award, as well as a place in the Alpha Chi National College Honor Society. Outside the classroom, she was a member of the Adopt a Grandparent Club.

Hannah completed her internship in a second-grade classroom at Kearsarge Regional Elementary School in New London. Her Capstone project, "Adverse Childhood Experiences' Impact on Post-Traumatic Growth in College Students," explored the impact of early trauma on young adults in a higher education setting and was awarded the Capstone prize in child development.

One faculty member said, "Hannah's academic standing and success are direct results of her ability to synthesize pertinent information across all content areas as well as her extraordinary work ethic. These qualities will serve her well as she continues to pursue a career in teaching."

After graduation, Hannah will attend the Upper Valley Educators Institute (UVEI) to earn her teaching certificate before seeking employment as an elementary school teacher.

COLBY-SAWYER AWARD

The Colby-Sawyer Award is given to the senior who, in the opinion of the faculty, best exemplifies the ideals of the college in personal dignity, intellectual growth, contributions to campus life and constructive influence on other students.

TROY CAPPOS '22

Troy Cappos, an athletic training major from Peabody, Mass., distinguished himself as a student with intellectual curiosity, leadership skills both inside and outside the classroom and a commitment to his own personal and professional growth. Through his natural ability to lead, motivate and support his classmates, Troy made noteworthy contributions to his peers, his program and the campus community.

As a student, Troy actively pursued experiences that would challenge him and test his knowledge. He is a reflective listener who gave freely of his time and expertise in the clinical setting. He served as a lab monitor, teaching assistant and resource to his fellow students. In the spring of 2021, Troy actively pursued opportunities to intern with an NCAA Division I institution, ultimately securing a summer internship with the University of Florida. That internship of more than 200 hours was in addition to the five 100-400-hour clinical experiences he completed for his major. As a result, Troy is graduating with well over 1,400 clinical hours, almost double the athletic training graduation minimum.

In addition to his scholarship and leadership in the classroom, Troy was a two-year member of the men's track and field team, and he played men's club rugby, serving as captain during his senior year. He was also a member of the Presidential Blue Key Society and the Exercise and Sport Sciences Club, and he served as the vice president of the Athletic Training Club.

Upon graduation, Troy will sit for the Athletic Training Board of Certification exam. He hopes to work as an athletic trainer somewhere in New England.

NINA HILLS '22

Nina Hills, a biology major with both premedical and pre-veterinary tracks and a minor in chemistry, is a strong, well-rounded student and an active participant in the life of the college. From the moment she arrived at Colby-Sawyer from her home in Jacksonville, Fla., Nina sought opportunities to make positive contributions to the community, and she quickly established herself as a campus leader.

In Nina's first semester on campus, she joined the women's track and field team, African Student Association, Navigators Christian Club, Dance Club, Student Government Association, Colby-Sawyer Players, Biology Club and Improv Anonymous, and she participated in the Emerging Leaders program. When she was a sophomore, Nina's classmates selected her as the recipient of the Ann Gulick Award, presented to the sophomore student who best exemplifies, through voluntary service, the qualities of reliability, loyalty and unselfishness. Nina maintained a high level of engagement and involvement throughout her four years at the college. As a student leader, Nina served on Community Council and the Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Task Force. She was an orientation leader, a peer mentor with Student Success and Retention, a mentor for the Summit Scholars summer program and a resident assistant. ACADEMIC REGALIA

The **gown** worn by a bachelor is distinguished by long, pointed sleeves. The gown worn by a master has oblong sleeves. The gown of a doctor has rounded sleeves, velvet panels around the neck and down the front and three velvet bars on the sleeves.

Hoods are lined in silk in the official colors of the institution granting the degree. For Colby-Sawyer College, those colors are royal blue and white. The color of the hood trim indicates the degree earned. The hoods are trimmed in apricot for master of science in nursing, drab for master of business administration, white for bachelor of arts, brown for bachelor of fine arts and gold for bachelor of science.

Honor cords of blue and green are worn by graduates who are members of the college's chapter of the Alpha Chi National College Honor Society. Honor cords of blue and white are worn by graduates who have earned the college's Wesson Honors Program Scholars Certificate. Honor cords of platinum and blue are worn by graduates who are members of the college's chapter of Psi Chi, the International Honor Society in Psychology. Honor cords of lavender and white are worn by members of the college's chapter of Sigma Theta Tau International, the Honor Society of Nursing. Honor cords of green and gold are worn by graduates who are members of the college's chapter of Sigma Beta Delta International Honor Society in Business, Management and Administration. Honor cords of red and white are worn by graduates who are members of the college's chapter of Lambda Pi Eta, the Honor Society of the National Communication Association. Honor cords of red, yellow and blue are worn by graduates who are members of the college's chapter of Iota Tau Alpha, the National Honor Society for Athletic Training Education.

Sashes of gold are worn by graduates who are senior class or Student Government Association officers.

Tassels of gold are worn by students who will graduate with honors of *summa cum laude*, *magna cum laude* or *cum laude*.

The ceremonial collar, worn by President Susan D. Stuebner, is emblematic of the presidential office. Its central portion is a silver pendant that displays the Colby-Sawyer College seal. On the obverse, in tiny, cut diamonds, the initials S.F.C. signify Susan Farnum Colby, who married James B. Colgate. She served as the first teacher and principal of Colby Academy, the institution that formed the foundation upon which the present college is built. The college seal is enriched by a laurel wreath and surmounted by the star from the state seal, signifying the authority granted to the college by the State of New Hampshire. Symbolic of the bond that joins Colby Academy to Colby-Sawyer College is the Colgate family coat of arms in the central portion of the insignia.

Both Susan Farnum Colby Colgate and her daughter, Mary Colgate, offered material assistance during the crucial early days of the institution. It is fitting that one of the medallions bound to the coat of arms by silver links is emblazoned with an engraving of Colby Academy and the other with an engraving of Colgate Hall. Susan Colby taught in the Academy Building, which was erected in 1837. Colby-Sawyer students study to this day in Colgate Hall, one of the gifts of Mary Colgate.
